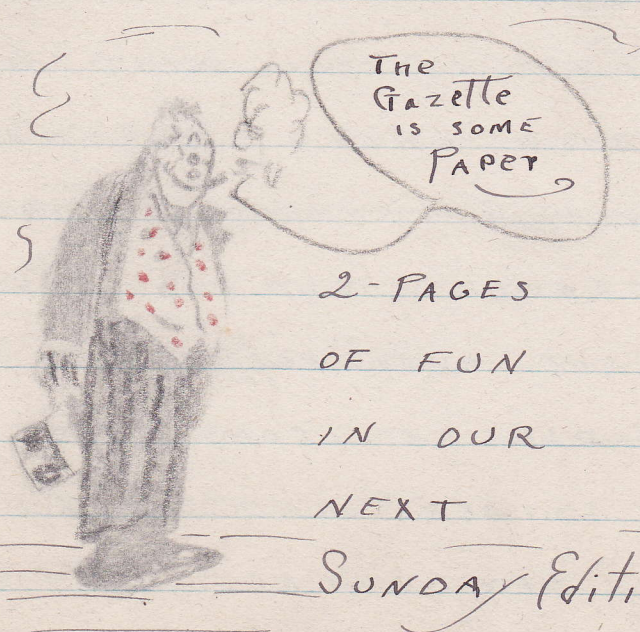

DETROIT FOUNDED 215 YEARS AGO BY
CADILLAC

Detroit was founded MORE THAN 200 YEARS AGO BY ANTOINE de la Mothe CADILLAC AND CELEBRATED THE ANNIVERSARY OF ITS FOUNDING JULY 24, 1901. IT WAS THE FIRST COLONY WEST OF MONTREAL AND WAS FOUNDED UNDER THE INSTRUCTIONS OF THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT, IN ORDER TO PROTECT THE FRENCH TRADERS AND TO PREVENT THE ENCROACHMENT OF THE ENGLISH. THE COMPANY THAT CAME WITH CADILLAC CONSISTED OF 50 CIVILIANS 50 SOLDIERS AND 100 ALGONQUIN INDIANS. A SITE OF THE NEW VILLAGE WAS CHOSEN JULY 24, 1701. AND WORK ON A PALISADE ENCLOSURE WAS BEGUN AT ONCE. THE PLACE WAS CALLED FORT PONTCHARTRAIN, AFTER THE MINISTER OF THE FRENCH KING, LOUIS XIV. — — — — — CONTINUED NEXT WEEK

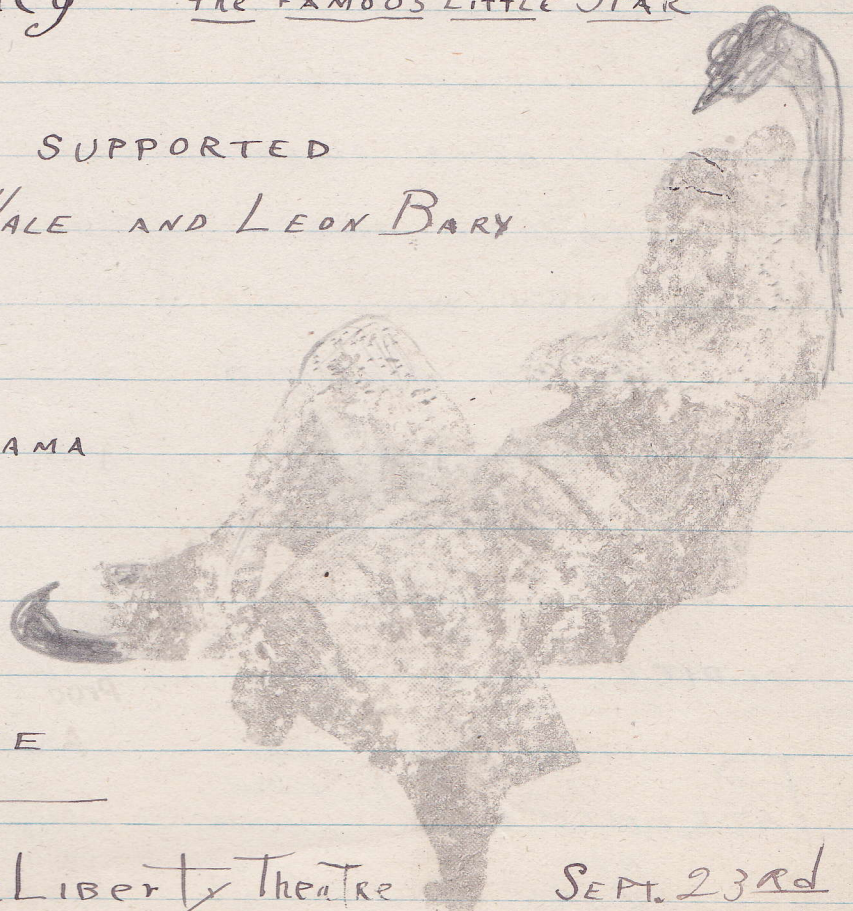
